Kevin DeCock, director of CDC's new Center for Global Health, said fundamental changes in public health have come about because of new technologies, such as cell phones and computers, as well as new public health networks that allow much quicker responses.

of cholera, according to the federal Ministry of Health. Reported cases almost triple those of 2009.

NIMRERT collected samples of stool, water and vomitus for laboratory diagnosis at the NIMR outstation laboratory and the headquarters laboratory in Lagos to test for *Vibrio cholerae*, according to NIMR Director of Research Oni Idigbe. The institute now has the capabilities to help fight various infectious diseases ravaging the country, such as cholera, tuberculosis, and malaria. NIMR uses molecular techniques to identify the strains, the source, and mode of transmission by comparing the genotypic resemblance and, most important, drug resistance patterns to assist in effective management of the infection. 2010 Annual Meeting Encourages NPHI Strengthening



U.S. CDC Director Tom Frieden emphasized the importance of a national focus on public health problems that links national efforts with local programs.

Countries can learn from the experiences of others to strengthen disease surveillance and outbreak investigation and control activities. That theme resounded throughout the 2010 IANPHI Annual Meeting in November, which drew national public health directors from some 50 countries to Atlanta to share their experiences linking science to action. Attendees addressed topics ranging from disaster preparedness and response to laboratory systems, injury control, and immunization policies.

Membership Fees, Donations Will Help Sustain IANPHI’s Future

To promote IANPHI’s long-term organizational sustainability, members in November approved new membership fees and voted to support an IANPHI Foundation to manage those fees as well as funds from other sources. Beginning in 2011, membership dues will be \$500, \$1,500, or \$3,000 USD per year for low-, middle-, and high-income countries, respectively. Associate members will pay half the fee of an institutional member. If the country has more than one member institute, each will pay 2/3 of the regular fee.

Contributions above the fees are being solicited from higher-resource countries; institutes in Finland, Norway, and the United States have already pledged generous donations to help sustain IANPHI’s future and the participation of countries all over the world, whatever their resources. 
